Listed below is as selection of some of the key pieces of research and community resources I have personally found valuable. There are many more and I encourage people to seek out the research that resonates with them to help with self advocacy if needed.

"Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) is being widely promoted as an approach to be used on people who are disabled and/or neurodivergent and display behaviours others do not wish to see. Often the disabled person has significant sensory, communication, trauma or medical needs and rights that are not met. Despite a broad buy-in, PBS is not actually supported by Disabled People's Organisations and allies. This is because PBS does not meet human rights, has a poor quality evidence base and its risks and harms are not understood."
